Structure Governance & Management

Governing Document

Quiet Waters secured Scottish Charitable Incorporated Organisation (SCIO) status on the 10th of September 2015 and is governed by its constitution. The charity is regulated by the Office of the Scottish Charity Regulator (OSCR) and its charity number is SC023661.

Appointment of Trustees

New trustees are appointed to the board through recommendation by existing trustees, advertising, or word of mouth. The application process includes an interview with current trustees including the Chair, take up of references and the prospective trustee being proposed and seconded at a trustee meeting or AGM. New trustees must accept the role in writing and confirm their support for the aims, objects and founding principles of the charity.

Organisational Structure

The organisation is a one-tier structure where the trustees and the members are the same. The charity is governed by a board of trustees responsible for the strategic direction and governance of the charity.

During the accounting year the charity employed two staff members.

- The Practice Manager (title changed to Counselling Coordinator see below) who has responsibilities that include taking and managing referrals, initial assessments, supervision, support, and development of volunteers.
- The Office Administrator who provides administrative support for the charity, including drafting funding applications and monitoring and evaluation of projects.

The trustees are particularly aware of their responsibilities and adhere to the charity's policies and procedures.

Objectives & Activities

Objectives

The charitable purposes of the SCIO ("the Charitable Purposes") are:

- To advance the mental health and promote the wellbeing of families and individuals, enabling them to overcome their personal, relational, and spiritual difficulties; enhancing their ability to cope with bereavement, trauma, and loss, and re-establishing their sense of self-worth and belonging within the family and wider community through:
 - o the provision of listening, support, information, and counselling services tailored to meet the needs of individuals and the local community.
 - o the provision of a service that is easily accessible to those in need, and a supportive and confidential setting where they can feel safe, respected, and valued.





• To advance education through the provision of comprehensive training packages in pastoral care and counselling.

Activities

The main activities of the charity are the provision of counselling and listening services for the people of Central Scotland including the following:

- Counselling service for individuals and couples struggling with personal and relationship issues, past hurts, and present problems.
- Bereavement service offering listening and support to those who have experienced loss.
- Prison Services at HM Prison Stirling. This is a bereavement support service.
- Training events for our own volunteers and supporters. These events are also open to people working in related areas, including local churches and voluntary organisations and provide opportunities for enhancing skills and knowledge and for reaching continuing professional development (CPD) goals.

Our services are delivered by teams of suitably qualified and trained volunteers who are engaged in continuing professional development and have opportunities to meet from time to time. All counselling and listening volunteers are allocated to peer supervision groups which meet regularly. Students in training also contribute to the provision of services under appropriate supervision.

Our fully trained counsellors are members of an appropriate professional body usually either the Association of Christian Counsellors (ACC), Counselling and Psychotherapy in Scotland (COSCA) or the British Association of Counselling and Psychotherapy (BACP).

As an organisation we are affiliated to the BACP and work within its ethical framework.

Personnel

During the year the Chair, Tom Brown, retired as did the Trustee, Dan Rous. We also saw the resignation of Laura Caldwell, Office Administrator, and the retirement of Caroline McLoughlin, the Practice Manager. The Board are very appreciative of all their contributions to the work of Quiet Waters. The position of Office Administrator was filled with the appointment of Jan Wiseman and the position of Practice Manager was filled by William Shreenan as Counselling Coordinator, a change to the job title that

more accurately reflects the role.

We have 8 counsellors at present (5 of whom are fully qualified and 3 who are students). We have 4 bereavement listeners. We continue to recruit both counsellors and listeners. In addition, we have 2 clerical/admin volunteers. We have 2 part-time employees, our Counselling Coordinator, and an Office Administrator. We also employ a cleaner and some of our volunteers act as a gardener on an ad-hoc basis.

Service provision

The majority of our services are delivered face to face at our premises. A small number of clients still receive services via Zoom, but this is not our preferred method of delivery both for the counsellor and

for the client.

We have completed 702 sessions of counselling and listening in the last year. This is broken down as follows:

This represents an increase over 25% on the previous year.

The demand for our services remains high. We always have significant waiting lists for our services and we endeavour to "signpost" people to alternative services in case support is available earlier than we can provide. The main reason for this is the availability of volunteer trained counsellors within Quiet Waters.

Effectiveness of Quiet Waters

We attempt to measure outcomes from our services in several ways.

- Clients are invited to give both verbal and written feedback at the end of their time with us. They are asked to complete a closing questionnaire which contains several outcome measures.
- We also use a questionnaire called CORE, which clients complete at the start and at the end of contact with us. This is widely used as an outcome measure in counselling.

These measures are not just helpful to us in reassuring us that we help people but is of huge interest to funders who regularly ask us for evidence of the effectiveness of our interventions.

Maintenance

As well as carrying out ongoing routine maintenance, we undertook major repairs to the roof, and counselling room 3 and replaced the boiler

Objectives for the coming year and beyond.

Our key objectives for the coming year are:

- Recruit 2 or 3 new Board members.
- Continue with our fundraising to obtain sufficient capital to purchase our premises while still generating enough income to meet our running costs.
- Increase the use of the premises by recruiting new volunteers, especially trained counsellors.
- Increase the reserves to maintain 1 years full running costs
- Increase the use of the premises by holding more counselling sessions, bereavement sessions and training sessions.

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Future of Quiet Waters

The last year has probably been the most challenging in the organisation's history. We have been under pressure in several areas. As we previously intimated, we made the decision to raise funds to purchase our current premises from the owners, the Church of the Nazarene. Shortly after we made that decision the Covid pandemic struck, and we postponed fundraising for this project. We are now moving forward with the intention to purchase the building within the next financial year

We still struggle with funding for day-to-day running costs. We raise money in three ways;

- firstly, we have a small number of regular donors to whom we are very grateful,
- secondly, although we do not charge for our services, historically many clients have given us donations but the funds generated are very small.
- thirdly, through grant funding.

We have a policy of operating with 6 months of financial reserves, but are looking to increase this to 12 months to give more security, particularly for the paid members of staff.

Grant funding

We are very grateful for all funding received, some of which was restricted and some unrestricted. Our major grant funding this year was:

Independent Examiner's report

Report to the Trustees of Quiet Waters on the accounts for the year ending 30 September 2024, which are set out on pages 7 to 12.

Respective responsibilities of Trustees and Examiner

Notes to the accounts

1. Basis of preparation

These accounts have been prepared on the receipts and payments basis in accordance with the Charities and Trustee Investment (Scotland) Act 2005 and the Charities Accounts (Scotland) Regulations 2006 (as amended).

2. Transactions with Trustees and connected persons

During the period no remuneration was paid to any Trustees or connected persons.

During the period no expenses were reimbursed to any Trustees.

During the period there were no transactions with any Trustees or connected persons.

The Charity has trustee indemnity insurance cover for all its Trustees.

3. Funds

The Charity has both unrestricted and restricted funds; the unrestricted funds consist of the General Fund and certain designated funds.

The unrestricted funds may be used at the discretion of the Trustees in the furtherance of the objects of the Charity; the designated funds are intended by the Trustees for particular purposes, but the Trustees are not bound by these intentions.

The restricted funds may be used only for particular purposes, because they are raised for these purposes or because of stipulations by the donors.
